



## **SURVEY ON LANGUAGE USE BY PRE-SCHOOL CHILDREN**

This survey is being undertaken to assess language practice among young children.

This is part of the Islands Gaelic Research Project (IGRP) which is being carried out by Soillse to research the vitality of Gaelic language and culture. Soillse is an inter-university Gaelic research collaboration led by the University of the Highlands and Islands, of which a central research objective is developing a meaningful partnership with the Gaelic communities of Scotland and elsewhere.

The IGRP will study the vitality of Gaelic in key locations in the Western Isles. This study of Gaelic language development among children **aged 3-5** is a key component of the project. Please be assured that this is not an assessment of pre-school provision in the Western Isles. We believe that the language usage of the youngest members of our communities is an important linguistic marker for the Gaelic language, and for community and cultural vitality.

We acknowledge the additional burden this places upon you, and your participation is hugely appreciated. Your responses will contribute to language planning to safeguard Gaelic as a community language. This element of the IGRP has the support of Comhairle nan Eilean Siar's Gaelic Education Advisory Committee; all sgoiltean-àraich/pre-schools in the Western Isles have been approached, and you are strongly encouraged to participate.

All staff involved in delivering this questionnaire have Protection of Vulnerable Groups clearance, and the research methodology has been approved by the Board of Ethics of the University of the Highlands and Islands. All data collected will be anonymised, and treated in the strictest confidence, meaning that it will not be possible to identify individual responses when the project results are presented.
